Reality Catching Up to Science Fiction

With the emergence of public artificial intelligence products, there is increased focus on how they may affect our society and lives. Europe's Double Trouble UK's: Ukraine and the UK The Marcella Woodworth Lecture

Martin Walker explains that Europe has two "UK" problems, Ukraine and the UK. War fatigue will be growing for a negotiated settlement between Russia and Ukraine and its financial supporters, the U.S. and the EU. New elections in Britain could deliver a center-left government committed to moving closer to the EU.

Why Americans Love and Hate Government

After communism's collapse, many Americans believed free markets and limited government would bring widespread democracy and prosperity. With terrorism, a financial crisis, and COVID, American attitudes shifted from free market advocacy to defense of authoritarian policies. *Dr. Jeremi Suri* will explore why this shift occurred, and implications for the future of democracy.

- FEBRUARY 15 -

Me Worry? Non-Traditional Threats to Global Security

Global travel, communication, and technology bring benefits and threats to humankind. - MARCH 14 -

Insurrection in America: The Rise in Political Violence

Escalating incidents of violence across the U.S. pose the biggest threats to the nation, according to retired *Army Lt. Gen. Russel Honoré.* Police violence has also increased. What is causing this increase and how can we deal with it? General Honoré will share his thoughts.

The U.S. invested heavily in building Ukraine's ability to defend itself. Putin knew time was not on his side and attacked massively in February 2022. *Dr. Robert Barylski* will explain where we are now and what comes next.

Rod Adams is a managing partner with Nucleation Capital, a venture capital fund focusing on advanced nuclear energy and deep decarbonization. The fund is building a portfolio of innovative ventures using a new model of venture fundraising that allows accredited investors to make modest quarterly investments.

Mr. Adams has been the publisher of *Atomic Insights* since 1995 and host of the Atomic Show podcast since 2006. He worked at Babcock & Wilcox as a member of a team developing a small modular reactor called mPower. He served for 33 years in the U.S. Navy, U.S. Naval Reserves, and U.S. Naval Academy. He served on two nuclear submarines and in a variety of submarine support roles at Navy Headquarters in Washington, D.C.

In 1993 Mr. Adams founded Adams Atomic Engines, a small modular reactor (SMR) company that was ahead of the bleeding edge. After 2003 interest in that technology sector began growing among investors and government entities in the U.S. and internationally. The interest has been expanding rapidly in the period since Russia invaded Ukraine.

Mr. Adams holds a B.S. in English from the U.S. Naval Academy and an M.S. in Systems Technology from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School.



Dr. Robert V. Barylski is a retired associate professor in the Department of Government and International Relations at USF Sarasota and former Dean of the University prior to his retirement.

An expert on civil-military relations in Russia, Dr. Barylski published *The Soldier in Russian Politics* 1988-1996: Duty, Dictatorship and Democracy

under Gorbachev and Yeltsin. He travels to Russia frequently and speaks and writes on political and economic reconstruction in the former Soviet Union. He is particularly interested in the development of oil resources in Russia and the newly independent nations on its borders.

In recent years Dr. Barylski has become one of the leading experts on Russian policy towards states and peoples of Islamic heritage. He has also spoken to SILL audiences on the rise of tycoons in the Russian economy and the relationships between Russia, China, and Iran. He has made occasional expert contributions to the Voice of America for broadcast to the greater Caspian region and has participated in U.S. policy symposia at the U.S. Central Command.

Dr. Barylski holds an undergraduate degree in political science from Brown University and graduate degrees in Russian area studies and political science from Harvard.

Dr. Bruce Hoffman has been studying terrorism and insurgency for nearly five decades. He is a professor at Georgetown University's Walsh School of Foreign Service and former director of both its Center for Jewish Civilization and its Security Studies Master of Arts degree program. Dr. Hoffman is also currently the Shelby Cullom and Kathryn W. Davis Senior Fellow for Counterterrorism

and Homeland Security at the Council on Foreign Relations, and the George H. Gilmore Senior Fellow at the U.S. Military Academy's Combating Terrorism Center.

Dr. Hoffman is the author of the award-winning book, *Anonymous Soldiers* (2015). His other books include *Inside Terrorism* (3rd edition, 2017), cited as one of the 25 most notable books published by Columbia University Press on the occasion of its 125th anniversary and *The Evolution of the Global Terrorist Threat* (2014). He is co-author of *God, Guns, and Sedition: Far-Right Terrorism in America*, which is scheduled to be published in December 2023.

Dr. Hoffman holds degrees in government, history, and international relations. He received his doctorate from Oxford University.



Lieutenant General Russel L. Honoré retired from the U.S. Army after 37 years on active duty in a variety of command and staff positions which focused on defense support to civil authorities and homeland defense. He planned the responses to the Shuttle Columbia Tragedy and the D.C. Sniper Shootings.

General Honoré supported the Defense Department response to numerous hurricanes, not the least of which was Hurricane Katrina that nearly devastated the population of New Orleans in 2005. He commanded Joint Task Force Katrina which dealt with the humanitarian crisis and safety of tens of thousands of people impacted by the disaster. He was also in charge of military responses to eight other hurricanes.

Recognized for his take-charge attitude in the wake of disasters, in retirement General Honoré was asked to lead the investigation into the January 6, 2021 Capitol riots. At the request of House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, he rendered a report as to corrective actions that need to be implemented to ensure such a tragedy does not successfully recur. General Honoré is a noted public speaker and author.



Charlayne Hunter-Gault is an award-winning journalist whose works have appeared in The New Yorker, The New York Times, PBS, NPR and CNN. She is the author of five books including My People, deemed one of the best nonfiction books of 2022. Ms. Hunter-Gault worked for 20 years with the PBS NewsHour, as both NPR and later CNN's Johannesburg bureau chief, and as a contributor to The New Yorker.

Ms. Hunter-Gault has won numerous honors including two Peabody and two Emmy awards. She was inducted into the National Association of Black Journalists Hall of Fame, received the Black Enterprises Legacy Award and the Washington Press Club Foundation's Lifetime Achievement Award. Her latest award is also for Lifetime Achievement from the Anisfield Wolf Book Awards, which annually recognizes authors whose work explores racism and diversity.

Ms. Hunter-Gault holds a B.A. in journalism from the University of Georgia.



Carla Koppell is a vice dean for the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service and Managing Director of the Georgetown Institute for Women, Peace and Security. She has worked in over 30 conflict zones throughout the world. Lampton is an Oksenberg-Rohlen Fellow at Stanford University's Asia-Pacific Research Center and Hyman Professor and Director of China Studies Emeritus at the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). He is a former chairman of the The Asia Foundation, former president of the National Committee on United States-China Relations.

and former dean of faculty at SAIS.

Dr. Lampton's most recent book is *Following the Leader: Ruling China, from Deng Xiaoping to Xi Jinping.* It was initially published in January 2014 and was issued in a second edition with a new preface in 2019. His current field research focuses on Beijing's effort to build high-speed and other rail lines to Singapore from South China and involves interviews and field research in eight countries. The underlying issue is how to conceive of Chinese power. He is also author of *The Three Faces of Chinese Power: Might, Money, and Minds* (2008).

Dr. Shelley Rigger is Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dean of Faculty, and Brown Professor of Asian Studies at Davidson University. Her research and writing focus on Taiwanese politics and the relationships among the United States, the People's Republic of China, and Taiwan.

In 2019-2020 Dr. Rigger was a Fulbright scholar at National Taiwan University in Taipei, studying the political and social views of Taiwanese youth. She has been a visiting professor at universities in the People's Republic of China-Fudan University (2006) and Shanghai Jiaotong University (2013 & 2015) and a visiting researcher at National Chengchi University in Taiwan in 2005. Dr. Rigger is also non-resident fellow of the China Policy Institute at Nottingham University and a senior fellow of the Foreign Policy Research Institute. She interacts frequently with U.S. government officials, especially in the Taiwan policy field.

She has written two books for general readers on Taiwan: Why Taiwan Matters: Small Island, Global Powerhouse (2011) and The Tiger Leading the Dragon: How Taiwan Propelled China's Economic Rise (2021). Dr. Rigger is a director of The Taiwan Fund, a closedend investment fund specializing in Taiwan-listed companies. She holds a B.A. from Princeton University and a Ph.D. from Harvard University.



Amb. Dennis Ross is counselor and William Davidson Distinguished Fellow at The Washington Institute for Near East Policy. For more than 12 years he played a leading role in shaping U.S. involvement in the Middle East peace process. He dealt directly with the principals and was the U.S. point man on the peace process in both the George H. W. Bush and the Bill Clinton administrations.

Amb. Ross served two years as special assistant to President Obama and National Security Council Senior Director for the Central Region, and six months as special advisor on Iran to Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton. Previously he played a prominent role in U.S. policy towards the former Soviet Union and the unification of Germany and its integration into NATO.

Amb. Ross's most recent book, *Be Strong and of Good Courage:* How Israel's Most Important Leaders Shaped Its Destiny, written with his colleague David Makovsky, profiles four Israeli prime ministers who made historic choices. It explores lessons from these decisions for guidance on dealing with the fateful choice that Israel's leaders must soon confront or by default become a binational state.

A graduate of UCLA, Amb. Ross has been named UCLA alumnus of the year.

Amb. Eric Rubin was elected to serve as the President of the American Foreign Service Association (AFSA) after his posting as U.S. Ambassador to Bulgaria (2016-2019). He retired from the Foreign Service in 2023.

Having joined the Foreign Service in 1985 after graduating from Yale, he started as a political and human rights officer in Honduras (1985-1988). In

1989 he was assigned to the State Department's Operations Center. From 1989 to 1991 he worked in the Office of Soviet Union Affairs where he monitored and reported on the collapse of the Soviet Union. Next, he served as the security affairs officer for Central and Eastern Europe.

Amb. Rubin left Washington in 1994 for Kiev, Ukraine as Deputy Political Counsellor. In 2001 he was posted to Chiang Mai, Thailand as Consul General.

In 2004 he returned to Washington as the director of the Office of Policy Planning and Coordination in the Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs. Dr. Peter W. Singer is Strategist at New America, a Professor of Practice at Arizona State University, and Founding and Manager Partner at Useful Fiction LLC. The Smithsonian named him one of the nation's 100 leading innovators, Defense News one of the 100 most

influential people in defense issues, and $\it Foreign\ Policy$ to their Top 100 Global Thinkers List.

A transformational change agent and visionary, he brings deep experience working at the nexus of economic development, international security, and political change, areas closely linked to Corus' mission to serve people experiencing poverty and marginalization overseas.

A former U.S. Ambassador to Greece and Belarus, Amb. Speckhard has had a long and distinguished career in government service. He has deep experience with countries in transition from supporting Russia, Ukraine, and the former Soviet states following the end of the Cold War, to helping Eastern European countries in strengthening their nascent democracies and joining NATO, to coordinating Iraq's post-war reconstruction and recovery effort. He also understands the transformational power of technology and data science, having been a Senior Fellow with Palantir Technologies.

Amb. Speckhard serves as a Senior Advisor to the Center for Strategic and International Studies and is on the Board of Visitors of the University of Wisconsin's La Follette School of Public Affairs.



Dr. Angela Stent is Director of the Center for Eurasian, Russian and East European Studies and Professor of Government and Foreign Service at Georgetown University. She is also a Senior Fellow (non-resident) at the Brookings Institution and co-chairs its Hewett Forum on Post-Soviet Affairs. She was a member of the senior advisory panel for NATO's supreme allied commander in Europe for Admiral James

Stavridis and General Philip Breedlove. She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Dr. Stent won the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy's prize for the best book on U.S.-Russian Relations for her most recent book, *Putin's World: Russia Against the West and With the Rest* (2019). She won the American Academy of Diplomacy's Douglas Dillon prize for the best book on the practice of American Diplomacy for her previous book, *The Limits of Partnership: US-Russian Relations in the Twenty-First Century* (2014).

Dr. Stent received her B.A. from Cambridge University, her MSc. with distinction from the London School of Economics and Political Science and her M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard University.

Dr. Jeremi Suri holds the Mack Brown Distinguished Chair for Leadership in Global Affairs at the University of Texas at Austin. He is a professor in the University's Department of History and the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs.

Dr. Suri is the author and editor of eleven books on contemporary politics and foreign policy.

His latest book is *Civil War By Other Means: America's Long and Unfinished Fight for Democracy* (2022). His previous book, *The Impossible Presidency: The Rise and Fall of America's Highest Office*. was a *New York Times* Book Review Editor's Choice.

In 2018 Dr. Suri received the President's Associates Teaching Excellence Award from the University of Texas, and the Pro Bene Meritis Award for Contributions to the Liberal Arts. His writings appear widely in blogs and print media including *The New York Times, Washington Post, Houston Chronicle, Atlantic, Time, Wired, New Republic,* and *Foreign Policy*. Dr. Suri is also a frequent public lecturer and guest on radio and television programs. He hosts a weekly podcast, "This is Democracy," available through his professional webpage: https://jeremisuri.net.



Martin Walker has now retired after 30 years in journalism for the Guardian and UPI, and a second career with another ten years in thinktanks, including the World Policy Council, the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars and as Director of the Global Business Policy Council.

He is now enjoying his third career as a mystery novelist, and his 'Bruno, chief of police' novels

have now sold more than 4 million copies in 17 languages. Bruno's Cookbook, written with his wife, Julia, was awarded the Gourmand International prize as the world's best French cookbook, and they are now working on a second, Bruno's Garden Cookbook. He is also a Grand Consul of the wines of Bergerac, and was awarded a gold medal by the French government for his services to tourism.

Mr. Walker is a graduate of Balliol College at Oxford, England.

Richard Friedman

- 1930-2023 -

Richard Friedman served on the SILL board for 11 years. Richard was an accomplished lawyer (assistant state's attorney for Illinois under various administrations) and a great adventurer. An advocate for injury prevention for musicians, Ms. Horvath has given masterclasses and

Janet's parents, both classical musicians and Holocaust survivors, buried who and what they were before. Her first book, Playing(less) Hurt – An Injury Prevention Guide for Musicians, received international critical acclaim, winning a gold IPPY award in 2009.
