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Dr. Jeffrey Gedmin will discuss how Europe's biggest economy, a nation rich and problematic in history, is a country in flux. Voter ties to mainstream parties are loosening. There are signs of social fragmentation. Extremist elements are visible, and perhaps on the rise. Is German democracy in trouble?

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Richard Nixon went to China fifty years ago with the belief that joining with China would help contain the Soviet Union. Future Presidents enlarged his policies, until relations with Beijing became Washington's most important single bilateral relationship. Was "Engagement" a big mistake? *Dr. David Lampton* will discuss where U.S.-China relations are headed.

Americans see their political world through rosy readings of history and grandiose expectations for central government power. *Dr. Robert McClure* will discuss how we first deceive ourselves and then become depressed when government and politics fails to measure up to our fantasies.

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Our Own Worst Enemy: The Global Assault From Within on Modern Democracy

Democracy is in trouble around the world – but who is really to blame? *Thomas Nichols* challenges us to rethink the origins of anti-democratic movements and to consider whether the responsibility rests on the citizens of the democracies themselves.

- JANUARY 12 -Germany and Its Future Challenges

Dr. Jeffrey Gedmin will discuss how Germany will need to confront regional and global challenges. How will Berlin face Beijing, Moscow, and a range of growing foreign policy challenges? With less American backing and support, can Europe remain stable, secure and prosperous?

- JANUARY 19 -

Biological Weapons: The Unseen Casts a Shadow

Nothing is certain about biological weapons. China, Iran, India, Russia, and North Korea are thought to be continuing efforts with infectious pathogens. War games of a bioweapons attack show the U.S. in chaos by day 40. *Dr. John Sinnott* will explore how this might happen and how to prevent it.

- JANUARY 26 -Political Implications of Energy Transition

Momentum is building for fundamental changes in the way we produce and consume energy, which may become an impetus for significant political change. Traditional energy producers could face domestic challenges with winners and losers. *Amb. Richard Jones* will explain how the United States can best protect its global interests in such an environment.

- FEBRUARY 2 - Rivers of Iron:

High-Speed Railroads and Chinese Power in Southeast Asia

At the turn of this millennium, China had no high-speed railway industry or network at home. By 2020, China had developed an advanced domestic high-speed rail industry, laid 30,000 miles of track at home, and began to export systems abroad, targeting Southeast Asia. Is this "debt-trap diplomacy"? *Dr. David Lampton* will discuss: What are the implications of China's infrastructure push abroad?

- FEBRUARY 9 - U.S. Policy Towards the Middle East

The Joan MacDonnell Lecture

Amb. Dennis Ross sketches the contours of the Middle East facing the Biden administration, from the challenge posed by Iran's nuclear program, regional ambitions, and missile development to the opportunities presented by the burgeoning relations between Israel and many Sunni Arab states, symbolized by the Abraham Accords.

- FEBRUARY 16 -

2022 Elections: Perspectives on National and Florida Races

Control of the U.S. House and Senate, Florida's Governor, Cabinet, and all of Florida's 40 Senate and 120 House seats are at stake in 2022, again making the state the epicenter of politics. *Dr. Susan A. MacManus* will focus on the most partisan-competitive races and the state's diverse electorate.

- FEBRUARY 23 -

U.S. Military Presence in Africa: The Limits of Engagement

Violent extremism and terrorism are on the rise in Africa. *Amb. Charles Ray* will discuss the appropriate limits on U.S. military engagement on the continent to deal with this issue. While some kinetic military operations might be necessary, the emphasis should be on capacity building and training of local forces.

- MARCH 2 -Aftermath of the January 6 Capitol Attack

In the wake of the deadly siege on the U.S. Capitol on January 6, 2021, Lt. Gen. Russel Honoré (Ret.) was called on by Congress to lead a review of the Capitol's security deficiencies. He will speak of his wide-ranging findings which include common-sense responses to safeguard against future threats of domestic terrorism.

- MARCH 9 -

The Tigray Conflict and Ethiopia's Contested Federation

William Davison will look at the path to conflict in the province of Tigray and how it fits into a broader dispute over Ethiopia's controversial constitutional order, where an imperial legacy casts a long shadow over a diverse polity. He will suggest how consultation could produce stability for this long troubled region.

- MARCH 16 -The Paper Dragon

China presents some serious challenges for U.S. national security. But China also has a series of inherent weaknesses that we tend to overlook and that may actually present a more threatening scenario. *Dr. Mark Lowenthal* will discuss how the U.S. should address these issues.

- MARCH 23 -The Future of U.S. - China Relations

Over the past five years there has been a sharp decline in U.S.-China relations. Based on his extensive experience with the leadership of China, *Stephen Biegun* will share his insights into the agenda of Beijing and what the United States should do in response.

- MARCH 30 -

The Death of Expertise: The Campaign Against Knowledge and Why It's a Threat to Democracy

Increasing levels of information and education have, paradoxically, created an army of ill-informed and angry citizens who denounce intellectual achievement. Today, everyone knows everything, and all voices, even the most ridiculous, demand to be taken with equal seriousness. *Thomas Nichols* argues that these attacks on knowledge are undermining the future of democratic institutions.

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Stories That Never Made It Into Print: Backstairs at the White House

Thomas DeFrank has been a White House correspondent for more than 50 years, since the last months of the Lyndon Johnson administration. Some of his more entertaining and revealing reporting, especially personal interactions with many of the 11 presidents between LBJ and Joe Biden, has never been published. Until today.

- JANUARY 20 -Making Peace in the Middle East

The Trump administration brokered four Arab peace agreements with Israel in five months during 2020, known collectively as the Abraham Accords. Veteran diplomat *Brian Hook*, who was on the negotiating team, will explain the significance of the Accords and the foreign policy required to promote peace in the Middle East.

- JANUARY 27 - Independence Corrupted:

How America's Judges Really Make Their Decisions

Judge Charles B. Schudson will bring us behind the trial bench to meet judges analyzing trials and sentencings and explain how judges weigh life and death, million-dollar damages, and our civil rights. With scholarship and compelling cases, he will examine the personal, professional, and political pressures threatening judicial independence today, like never before.

- FEBRUARY 3 -

The Joe Roddy Lecture

Can Europe Become French Again?

The retirement of Angela Merkel, Brexit, and the disarray of Spanish and Italian politics paves the way for a new French seniority in Europe assuming, as is likely, Emmanuel Macron retains the Presidency in the 2022 elections. *Martin Walker* explores this possible outcome and its implications for the EU and other countries.

- FEBRUARY 10 -

How American Democracy Has Renewed Itself in the Past

The history of American democracy is rough, uneven, and incomplete. Our country has experienced many periods of democratic growth such as in the 20th century Civil Rights era, and repeated moments of democratic retraction and backlash, among them Reconstruction after the Civil War. *Dr. Jeremi Suri* will examine some of these moments in the past and the lessons for the present.

- FEBRUARY 17 -

Reckoning With the Legacy of White Supremacy in American Christianity

As the nation grapples with the legacy of racism, Christianity's role as a cornerstone of white supremacy has been largely overlooked. **Dr. Robert P. Jones** will explain that, as the dominant cultural power, white Christianity has been more than just complicit; rather, it has sustained a project of opposing black equality that has framed the entire American story.

- FEBRUARY 24 -

New Hardline President Raisi and U.S.-Iran Relations

Ebrahim Raisi, a cleric close to Iran's Supreme Leader, was elected and hardliners strengthened control over Iranian policy. By reputation, Raisi is deeply suspicious and hostile towards America and committed to regime preservation. *Dr. Mohsen Milani* discusses Raisi's views and their impact on nuclear talks, global and regional power rivalries.

- MARCH 3 -

Can a Democratic America Compete with a Totalitarian China

Dr. Robert Lieber will discuss how Chinese leaders believe America faces inevitable decline and that their path of Communist Party dictatorship is superior to that of the U.S. He contends China's model is deeply flawed and its economy and society increasingly fragmented. China's rulers overlook their own vulnerabilities and underestimate America's resilience and underlying strengths.

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Putin's World: Russia Against the West and With the Rest

How has Putin's Russia, with a per capita GDP the size of Italy's, a declining population, decaying infrastructure, and overdependence on hydrocarbon revenues, managed to reassert itself on the world stage? *Dr. Angela Stent* examines that question and suggests how the U.S. should now deal with Russia.

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The Islamic crescent stretches from Cyprus to Xinjiang. Today, *Dr. Robert Barylski* explains the thousand year balancing act between Russia, Turkey, and Iran and discusses how China's Silk Road strategy and the Taliban victory in Afghanistan impact this great Eurasian competition and its meaning for the United States.

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Like War: How Social Media Has Become Weaponized, and What We Need to Know About It

Peter Singer discusses livestream terrorist attacks, how presidents win elections over social media, and how viral misinformation alters the fate of nations in a battlespace playing out on smartphones. He will explain the rules of power in this age of social media and how we can navigate a world increasingly shaped by "likes" and lies.

Dr. Robert V. Barylski is a retired associate professor in the Department of Government and International Relations at USF Sarasota and former Dean of the University. An expert on civil-military relations in Russia, he published *The Soldier in Russian Politics 1988-1996: Duty, Dictatorship and Democracy under Gorbachev and Yeltsin*. He travels to Russia frequently and speaks and writes on political and economic reconstruction in the former Soviet Union.

He is particularly interested in the development of oil resources in Russia and the newly independent nations on its borders.

In recent years, he has become one of the leading experts on Russian policy towards states and peoples of Islamic heritage. He has also spoken to SILL audiences on the rise of tycoons in the Russian economy and the relationships between Russia, China and Iran.

Dr. Barylski has an undergraduate degree in political science from Brown University and graduate degrees in Russian area studies and political science from Harvard.



Peter Bergen is a journalist, documentary producer, Vice President for Global Studies and Fellows at New America, and CNN national security analyst. He is professor of practice at Arizona State University where he co-directs the Center on the Future of War, and the author or editor of nine books, which have been translated into 21 languages. Documentaries based on his books have been nominated for two Emmys and also won the Emmy for best documentary.

Mr. Bergen writes a weekly column for CNN.com and is a member of the Homeland Security Experts Group and a fellow at Fordham University's Center on National Security. He is on the editorial board of *Studies in Conflict & Terrorism*, a leading scholarly journal in the field, and has testified on Capitol Hill eighteen times about national security issues.

Mr. Bergen holds a degree in modern history from New College, Oxford, and has held teaching positions at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University.

Stephen E. Biegun has more than three decades of international affairs experience in government and the private sector. In 2021 he concluded his most recent government service as the Deputy Secretary of State, to which he was confirmed by the Senate with a vote of 90-3. Prior to his most recent government service, Mr. Biegun served for 15 years as a corporate vice president with Ford Motor Company.

Mr. Biegun began his career as a foreign policy specialist with the United States Congress, with a focus on Russia, the former Soviet Union, and Europe, ultimately rising to a number of senior-level positions including chief of staff of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and as the national security advisor to Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist. He served for two years as the Executive Secretary of the White House National Security Council and as an advisor and deputy to National Security Advisor Condoleezza Rice.

Mr. Biegun holds a B.A. in Russian language and political science from the University of Michigan.



William Davison is the Senior Analyst for Ethiopia at the International Crisis Group, an independent, non-profit, non-governmental organization committed to preventing and resolving deadly conflict. As a journalist and analyst, he has worked in and on Ethiopia for over a decade. For 2010 to 2017 he was the Ethiopia correspondent for Bloomberg. He also reported on Ethiopia frequently for *The Guardian*, *Al Jazeera*, *Foreign Policy*, and other international outlets. At that time, he

was the head of the Foreign Correspondents Association of Ethiopia.

In response to his forthright coverage of sensitive developments and issues in Ethiopia, he was deported from Ethiopia in early 2018. That year he founded Ethiopia Insight, an observer organization focused on the country and region. In 2019 he joined the International Crisis Group and was able to return to Ethiopia, only to be deported again in late 2020. He now continues his coverage of Ethiopia from his base in Kenya.

Thomas DeFrank is a contributing editor at *National Journal* and is the senior correspondent covering the White House on a regular basis. He is an award-winning journalist and bestselling author who has covered the White House since the final months of the Johnson administration and the last 14 Presidential elections.

Mr. DeFrank co-authored the memoirs of Secretary of State James Baker and has reported on the resignation of one President, the impeachment of a second, and was an eyewitness to two assassination attempts against a third. He was Newsweek magazine's White House correspondent for 25 years and Washington bureau chief of the New York Daily News for 16 years. His memoir of his time covering President Ford, Write It When I'm Gone, was a The New York Times and The Washington Post bestseller. President Ford once said of him: "You are one of the finest journalists I have ever known. Everyone I know feels the same way: you are fair, trustworthy and professional."

Mr. DeFrank graduated from Texas A&M University with high honors and has a master's degree from the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Jeffrey Gedmin is editor-in-chief and CEO of *American Purpose* magazine and media venture. He was President and CEO of the London-based Legatum Institute and served for four years as President and CEO of Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty. Prior to this he served as President and CEO of the Aspen Institute in Berlin.

Dr. Gedmin is the author/editor of several books and served as co-executive producer for two major PBS documentaries: "Spain's 9/11 and the Challenge of Radical Islam in Europe" (2007) and "The Germans, Portrait of a New Nation" (1995). He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and serves on several advisory boards. He is also co-chair of the Transatlantic Democracy Working Group, hosted at the German Marshall Fund of the United States.

Dr. Gedmin holds a B.A. in music from the American University, a master's degree in German Area Studies from American University, and a Ph.D. in German Area Studies and Linguistics from Georgetown University.

Lieutenant General Russel L. Honoré retired from the U.S. Army after 37 years on active duty in a variety of command and staff positions which focused on defense support to civil authorities and homeland defense. He planned the responses to the Shuttle Columbia tragedy and the D.C. sniper shootings. He supported the Defense Department response to numerous hurricanes, not the least of which was Hurricane Katrina that devastated the population of

New Orleans in 2005. He commanded Joint Task Force Katrina which dealt with the humanitarian crisis and safety of tens of thousands of people impacted by the disaster. He was also in charge of military responses to eight other hurricanes.

Recognized for his take-charge attitude in the wake of disasters, in retirement he was asked to lead the investigation into the January 6, 2021 Capitol riots. At the request of House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, he rendered a report as to corrective actions that need to be implemented to ensure such a tragedy does not happen again.

Honoré is the recipient of numerous military and civilian awards, including six honorary doctorates from schools such as Stillman College and the United States Army War College.



Brian Hook is an attorney and government official who worked for President George H.W. Bush, President George W. Bush, and President Donald Trump. He was the lead State Department official who negotiated peace agreements between Israel and the UAE, Bahrain, Sudan, and Morocco known collectively as the Abraham Peace Accords. He conducted secret negotiations with Iran in 2019 and 2020 that won the release of two American hostages, and in 2018 he flew

to North Korea to bring home three Americans held hostage by Kim Jong-Un. From 2016-2020 he led the campaign to counter the Iranian regime's deadly terrorism and pursuit of a nuclear weapon.

Mr. Hook practiced corporate law at Hogan & Hartson in Washington from 1999-2003. His many foreign policy articles have been published by *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal* and he has been featured by major media outlets around the world for his commentary on international affairs.

Mr. Hook holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from the University of St. Thomas, a master's degree in philosophy from Boston College, and a law degree from the University of Iowa College of Law.



Baroness Margaret Jay's career has combined government service, the media, and business. She graduated from Oxford University with a degree in Politics, Philosophy and Economics and began a 20 year career in broadcasting. Baroness Jay was appointed a life peer in July 1992 and acted as an opposition Whip in the House of Lords. She was also appointed as the first director of the National Aids Trust. Following the Labor Party election victory in 1997, she

was appointed to Tony Blair's government first as a Minister of State in the Department of Health and later to the Cabinet as Leader of the House of Lords, Lord Privy Seal and Minister for Women.

Baroness Jay played a pivotal role in the major reform that led to the removal of more than 660 hereditary peers (most of its hereditary members) in the House of Lords. She left government in 2001 and serves on the boards of British Telecom and the Independent News and Media Company. Since 2011 she has been Chair of the Select Committee on the Constitution in the House of Lords.



Dr. David M. Lampton is Oksenberg-Rohlen Fellow at Stanford University's Asia-Pacific Research Center and Hyman Professor and Director of China Studies Emeritus at the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). He is former Chairman of The Asia Foundation, former president of the National Committee on United States-China Relations, and former dean of faculty at SAIS.

Dr. Lampton's most recent book is *Rivers of Iron: Railroads and Chinese Power in Southeast Asia* (2020) His current field research focuses on Beijing's effort to build high-speed and other rail lines to Singapore from South China and involves interviews and field research in eight countries. The underlying issue is how to conceive of Chinese power. He is also author of *Following the Leader: Ruling China, from Deng Xiaoping to Xi Jinping* (2019) and *The Three Faces of Chinese Power: Might, Money, and Minds* (2008).

Dr. Lampton received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from Stanford University where, as an undergraduate student, he was a firefighter. He holds an honorary doctorate from the Russian Academy of Sciences' Institute of Far Eastern Studies.

Dr. Robert J. Lieber is Emeritus Professor of Government and International Affairs at Georgetown University, where he has previously served as Chair of the Government Department.

He is author or editor of 17 books on international relations and U.S. foreign policy and has served as an advisor to several presidential campaigns, to the State Department, and to the drafters of U.S. National

Intelligence Estimates. He is now completing *The Indispensable Nation: American Foreign Policy in a Turbulent World*.

Dr. Lieber has also taught at Harvard, Oxford and the University of California, Davis, and has been a Visiting Fellow at The Fondation Nationale Des Sciences Politiques in Paris, the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C., and Fudan University in Shanghai. His articles and op-eds have appeared in *The New York Times* and *The Washington Post*. His media appearances have included the NewsHour on PBS, and ABC, NBC, CBS, and CNN. Among his other credits is a walk-on part in the Alfred Hitchcock film classic, North by Northwest.

Dr. Lieber earned his undergraduate degree at the University of Wisconsin and his Ph.D. at Harvard University.



Dr. Mark Lowenthal is an author and adjunct professor at the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences at Johns Hopkins University in Washington, D.C. Dr. Lowenthal has written five books and over 90 articles or studies on intelligence and national security. His book *Intelligence: From Secrets to Policy* has become a standard undergraduate and graduate text.

In 2005 Dr. Lowenthal retired from a career working with the U.S. Intelligence Community as a recognized national security affairs expert. He is the former Assistant Director of Central Intelligence for Analysis and Production and former Vice Chairman for Evaluation on the National Intelligence Council (2002-2005). As Assistant Director, he was instrumental in having the Intelligence Community adopt the framework that provides guidance that serves as the basis upon which all analysis and production decisions are made. He has also served in the U.S. State Department's Bureau of Intelligence and Research as both an office director and as a Deputy Assistant Secretary of State.

Dr. Lowenthal holds a B.A. from Brooklyn College and a Ph.D. from Harvard University. In 1988 he was the Grand Champion on the television quiz show Jeopardy!

Dr. Susan A. MacManus is a University of South Florida Distinguished University Professor Emerita (Department of Government and International Affairs, School of Interdisciplinary Global Studies). From 1998 to 2015 she served as political analyst for WFLA News Channel 8 (Tampa's NBC affiliate). Since 2016, she has been the political analyst for ABC Action News (Tampa's ABC affiliate). She is a featured columnist on sayfiereview.com, a widely read Florida-based political

website, and has appeared on every major broadcast and cable television and radio network. Dr. MacManus is Florida's most-quoted political scientist. She is not affiliated with any political party.

Dr. MacManus has authored or co-authored numerous publications on Florida politics, including Florida's Minority Trailblazers: The Men and Women Who Changed the Face of Florida Government, Politics in Florida, Young v. Old: Generational Combat in the 21st Century? and Targeting Senior Voters. She and her mother, Elizabeth, also authored two local Florida history books: Citrus, Sawmills, Critters & Crackers: Early Life in Lutz and Central Pasco County and Going, Going, Almost Gone: Lutz-Land O' Lakes Pioneers Share Their Precious Memories.

Dr. MacManus received her M.A. from the University of Michigan and Ph.D. from Florida State University.



Dr. Robert McClure joined the Maxwell School of Syracuse University in 1969. He served as the director of the honors program and as Senior Associate Dean before retiring in 2014. Dr. McClure is a recipient of multiple awards including the Chancellor's Citation for Exceptional Academic Achievement.

Prior to joining the Maxwell Faculty, Dr. McClure was an American Political Science Association Congressional Fellow and a legislative assistant and

campaign aide. He also worked as a journalist. His first book, *The Unseeing Eye* (1976), co-authored with Thomas E. Patterson, was cited by the American Association of Public Opinion Research as one of the field's most influential works published in the second half of the 20th Century. A second book, written with Linda L. Fowler, *Political Ambition: Who Decides to Run for Congress* (1990), was published by Yale University Press. He is currently at work on a final book: *Limits to be Reckoned With: Why Americans Struggle to Govern Themselves in the 21st Century*.

Dr. McClure received his B.A. degree from DePauw University and his Ph.D. from Indiana University, Bloomington.

Dr. Mohsen Milani is the Executive Director of the Center for Strategic & Diplomatic Studies and Professor of Politics at the University of South Florida. He served as a department chair from 1998 to 2012.

Dr. Milani has written more than sixty academic articles and book chapters. His book, *The Making of Iran's Islamic Revolution*, has been used as required reading in many universities in the U.S., Europe, Japan,

Canada, and Iran. His recent publications include "The Ayatollah's Game Plan" (Foreign Affairs), "Rouhani's Foreign Policy" (Foreign Affairs), "The Rise and Fall of Rafsanjani" (The Atlantic), "Meet Me in Baghdad" (Foreign Affairs), "Iran's U.S. Policy" (Foreign Affairs), and "Iran's policy toward Iraq" (book chapter). He is currently writing a book about Iranian foreign policy.

At USF World, he has been conducting a new "Conversation Series on Global Security." Prominent experts have been invited to the program for in-depth conversations with him.

Born in Tehran, Dr. Milani completed his high school and higher education in the U.S. and received his Ph.D. in political science from the University of Southern California.



Thomas M. Nichols is Professor of National Security Affairs, U.S. Naval War College and a contributing writer at *The Atlantic*. He is also an instructor at the Harvard Extension School and an adjunct professor at the U.S. Air Force School of Strategic Force Studies. He is a former aide in the U.S. Senate and has been a Fellow of the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

He is the author of several books, including *The Death of Expertise: The Campaign Against Established Knowledge and Why It Matters* (Oxford 2017), an international best-seller that has been translated into fourteen foreign languages. His most recent book is *Our Own Worst Enemy: The Assault From Within on Modern Democracy*, which *Publisher's Weekly* called "A searing critique of contemporary political culture and the rise of illiberalism on both the right and the left."

In 2017, he was named one of the POLITICO 50 by *POLITICO* magazine, an annual list of "the key thinkers, doers and visionaries who are reshaping American politics and policy."

He is also a five-time undefeated Jeopardy champion, and was noted in the Jeopardy! Hall of Fame after his 1994 appearances as one of the all-time best players of the game.

Amb. Charles Ray served 30 years in the Foreign Service (from 1982 to 2012) after completing a 20-year career in the U.S. Army. He was Ambassador to Cambodia and Zimbabwe. Other Foreign Service assignments were: Guangzhou and Shenyang, China; Chiang Mai, Thailand; Deputy Chief of Mission in Freetown, Sierra Leone; Consul General in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam; Diplomat in residence, University of Houston; Political/Military Bureau in the State Department in Washington

and Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for POW/Missing Personnel.

Amb. Ray holds a B.S. from Benedictine College, Atchison, KS; an M.S. from the University of Southern California; and an M.S. from the National War College. He is also a graduate of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Army War College's Land Forces Commander Course, and the Defense Intelligence School's Postgraduate Intelligence Course.



During a 32-year Foreign Service career, *Amb. Richard H. Jones* served in such energy producers as Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Kuwait and Kazakhstan. After his retirement from the Foreign Service in 2008, Amb. Jones joined the International Energy Agency, an independent international organization within the rubric of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development in Paris, as its Deputy Executive Director. The IEA is charged with furthering the energy

security of its members, including the United States. In addition to his managerial and policy duties at the IEA, Amb. Jones conducted outreach on energy issues to important non-member countries including China, Russia, India, Saudi Arabia, Brazil and Mexico. Amb. Jones is fluent in Arabic, French, German, and Russian.

Amb. Jones earned a B.S. with distinction in mathematics from Harvey Mudd College in Claremont, CA, and a master's and doctorate in business/statistics from the University of Wisconsin.

Since leaving the IEA in 2013, Amb. Jones and his wife Joan have divided their time between homes in Florida and Colorado and visiting grandchildren in California and Japan.

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Dr. Robert Jones is the CEO and founder of the Public Religion Research Institute, a non-profit, non-partisan organization dedicated to conducting independent research into religion, culture, and public policy. He served as co-chair of the national steering committee for the Religion and Politics Sections of the American Academy of Religion.

Dr. Jones has served as a consultant and research fellow at several think tanks in Washington, D.C. He is the author of *The End of White Christian America* (2016), which examines the changes in U.S. demographics and religion and the impact on the social values. It won the 2019 Graemeyer Award in religion.

Dr. Jones holds a B.S. in Computing Science and Mathematics from Mississippi College, a M.Div. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. in religion from Emory University where he specialized in the sociology of religion, politics, and religious ethics.




Amb. Dennis Ross is counselor and William Davidson Distinguished Fellow at The Washington Institute for Near East Policy. For more than 12 years he played a leading role in shaping U.S. involvement in the Middle East peace process as the U.S. point man on the peace process in both the George H. W. Bush and Bill Clinton administrations. He served two years as special assistant to President Obama and National Security Council Senior Director for the Central Region,

and a year as special advisor to Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Earlier Amb. Ross played a prominent role in U.S. policy towards the former Soviet Union and the unification of Germany and its integration into NATO. His most recent book, *Be Strong and of Good Courage: How Israel's Most Important Leaders Shaped Its Destiny*, written with his colleague David Makovsky, profiles four Israeli prime ministers who made historic choices. It explores lessons from these decisions for guidance on dealing with the fateful choice that Israel's leaders must soon confront or by default become a binational state.

A graduate of UCLA, Amb. Ross received UCLA's highest medal and has been named UCLA alumnus of the year.



Judge Charles B. Schudson, a law professor and Wisconsin Reserve Judge Emeritus, has served as a state and federal prosecutor and as a trial and appellate judge. He has served on the faculties of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, and the National Judicial College. He served as an international observer for the 2006 Venezuelan presidential election.

He and his wife Karen, a psychotherapist, created

"Healing the Healers," a program they have presented for judges, police, social workers, nurses and others coping with the personal impact of working with cases of child sexual abuse.

Judge Schudson's published works include On Trial: America's Courts and Their Treatment of Sexually Abused Children (Beacon Press), and Independence Corrupted: How America's Judges Make Their Decisions (University of Wisconsin Press), a nominee for the 2018 National Book Award.

Judge Schudson is also an Arizona hiking guide and Search & Rescue volunteer. He is a graduate of Dartmouth College and the University of Wisconsin Law School.



Dr. Peter W. Singer is a Strategist at New America, a professor of practice at Arizona State University, and a Principal at Useful Fiction LLC. Previously he was Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution, where he was Director of the Center for 21st Century Security and Intelligence. He was described in *The Wall Street Journal* as "the premier futurist in the national- security environment" and the Smithsonian named him one of the nation's 100 leading innovators.

Dr. Singer's non-fiction books include *Corporate Warriors: The Rise of the Privatized Military Industry* (2003), *Wired for War: The Robotics Revolution and Conflict in the 21st Century* (2009); *Cybersecurity and Cyberwar: What Everyone Needs to Know* (2014) and *LikeWar: the Weaponization of Social Media* (2018).

He is also co-author of new type of novel, a technothriller used to communicate nonfiction research. *Ghost Fleet: A Novel of the Next World War* (2015) led to briefings everywhere from the White House to the Pentagon. His latest is *Burn-In: A Novel of the Real Robotic Revolution* (2020).

Dr. Singer received his B.A. from Princeton University and his Ph.D. from Harvard University.

Dr. John T. Sinnott is a physician, scientist, and business executive who is the Chairman of Internal Medicine at the University of South Florida (USF) College of Medicine. In 1992 he was named Director of Infectious Disease at USF and in 2006 was named Associate International Dean. While Director of Infectious Disease he started the USF Florida Institute for Infectious Disease which helped the state spearhead a bio defense education program and built

a nationally recognized infectious disease fellowship. Dr. Sinnott is currently the Director of the Institute.

Her publications include *Putin's World: Russia Against the West and With the Rest* (Twelve Books, 2019) for which she won the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy's prize for the best book on U.S-Russian Relations and *The Limits of Partnership: US-Russian Relations in the Twenty-First Century* (Princeton University Press, 2014), for which she won the American Academy of Diplomacy's Douglas Dillon prize for the best book on the practice of American Diplomacy.

Dr. Stent received her B.A. from Cambridge University, her MSc. with distinction from the London School of Economics and Political Science and her M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard University.

Dr. Jeremi Suri holds the Mack Brown Distinguished Chair for Leadership in Global Affairs at the University of Texas at Austin. He is a professor in the University's Department of History and the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs.

Dr. Suri is the author and editor of ten books on contemporary politics and foreign policy, most recently: The Impossible Presidency: The Rise and Fall

of America's Highest Office. Dr. Suri's research and teaching have received numerous prizes. In 2018 he received the Pro Bene Meritis Award for the Promotion of the Humanities. now sold more than four million copies in 17 languages. *The Bruno Cookbook*, written with his wife, Julia, was awarded the Gourmand International prize as the world's best French cookbook, and they are now working on a second, *Bruno's Garden Cookbook*. Mr. Walker is also a Grand Consul of the wines of Bergerac, and was awarded a gold medal by the French government for his services to tourism.





OVERVIEW

What a spectacular Music Mondays season we have lined up for Sarasota and Venice! The roster for the 2022 season features a kaleidoscope of musical artists from a myriad of artistic disciplines. All artists are new to Music Mondays and three are local musicians that you have likely heard in performance around the area. One incredible addition to the experience is one of the world's finest theremin performers. Thorwald Jørgensen, on March 21. Thorwald, a Dutch musician, will showcase his incredible gift



with the theremin, an electronic musical instrument which is controlled by the performer without physical contact. This will undoubtedly be one of the most intriguing Music Mondays that we've had over the past decade. Another unusual guest will be Mary Jo Heath, commentator for the Metropolitan Opera radio programs and HD presentations.

Additional programs feature a pair of cellists, Emilio and Cara Colón, and we'll hear about their chamber music festival in Puerto Rico. Local celebrities include Jonathan Godfrey, guitarist extraordinaire, Sarasota Orchestra principal violist Rachel Halvorson and singing actress Ann Morrison, cofounder of SaraSolo. Keyboard artists include concert organist Stephen Hamilton and pianist Vijay Venkatesh. Vocal artists showcased are Matthew Vickers, appearing with the Sarasota Opera this season and a trio of singers from the NY Gilbert & Sullivan Players. Geneva Lewis, violinist and Gabriel Martins, cellist will wow us with their virtuosity - two of the world's finest up and coming young musicians. Rounding out the season is flutist Richard Sherman, principal flutist with the Chautaugua Symphony and educator at Michigan State University. Rick and I were classmates at the Eastman School of Music and I'm looking forward to our musical reunion for the Music Mondays program.

During this past year, we lost Edward Alley who had assumed the role of producer/host for Music Mondays following the passing of his wife, June LeBell. We miss them both but recall fondly their enthusiasm for music. support for the Sarasota community, and incredible sense of humor. Their presence will continue to live on in our hearts. And, the season will again feature musical conversations with great artists in the tradition that June and Ed designed but with a slight twist - we are adding more musical performance to each session. Our venues have remained the same: Church of the Palms in Sarasota and Venice Presbyterian Church. Robert Sherman will continue in his role as host in Venice along with a new face to the Music Mondays program, Betsy Hudson Traba. Betsy is principal flutist with the Sarasota Orchestra and will be a wonderful addition as host.

We hope that you will join us on our journey this season - Music Mondays: Musical Conversations with Great Performers is a very special program presented by SILL, offering you a glimpse into the life of amazing artists.

Vijay Venkatesh, Piano

Vijay Venkatesh, Indian-American pianist, has been recognized on three continents as a pianist with profound musicianship, sparkling pianism and an innate sense of partnership. An immersive and versatile soloist, Mr. Venkatesh has performed extensively across the United States, Europe and Asia. He earned an Artist Diploma at the Colburn School.

- FEBRUARY 14 -

Rachel Halvorson, Viola

A native of San Antonio, TX, Rachel Halvorson joined the Sarasota Orchestra as principal violist in 2019. She also plays in the Sarasota Orchestra String Quartet. She is a passionate advocate for contemporary classical music, has performed with EnsembleNewSRQ and is a new faculty member at the Sarasota Music Conservatory.

Matthew Vickers. Tenor

Emilio, whose performances have been described as "lively, exciting, expressive and absolutely beautiful," is a professor at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and is established as a highly sought-after pedagogue.

Cara, a noted performer, pedagogue, and arts administrator is currently the Vice President of the American Cello Institute whose project, the International Chamber Orchestra of Puerto Rico, is a National Endowment for the Arts awardwinning organization that provides free access to concerts, educational events and television programming for children and communities throughout Puerto Rico and abroad.

He has been a soloist with The Florida Orchestra, members of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, the Choral Artists of Sarasota, the LaGrange Symphony Orchestra New Music Ensemble, the Pops Orchestra of Bradenton-Sarasota, the North Port Concert Band, members of the Sarasota Orchestra, and the Master Chorale of Tampa Bay.

Artists he has shared the stage with include Bernadette Peters, legendary Broadway composer Stephen Flaherty, and renowned trumpeter and conductor Byron Stripling. He has been a repeat guest lecturer at the Guitar Foundation of America International Festival and Competition and has recorded music for clients ranging from the Embassy of Spain to Norwegian Cruise Lines.

Rachel Halvorson, Violist

A native of San Antonio, TX, Rachel Halvorson joined the Sarasota Orchestra as principal violist in 2019. She also plays in the Sarasota String Quartet, a resident chamber ensemble for the orchestra. Rachel has performed with orchestras such as the Cincinnati, Houston, San Antonio, Akron, Syracuse Symphoria and New World symphonies, and Boston Symphony Orchestra in an opportunity through the Tanglewood Music Center.

During the summer season, she has joined Tanglewood, Spoleto Festival, National Repertory Orchestra, Crescendo (Hungary), and Credo Festival on fellowships. Rachel currently joins the Music in the Mountains festival in Durango, CO for their summer season.

Throughout his distinguished career, consistent critical review has earned Hamilton acclaim as a thoroughly engaging and popular personality and has firmly established his reputation as a leading and much sought-after virtuoso.

Highlights of Hamilton's international touring include recent concerts at Notre Dame in Paris, Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral in London. Dr. Hamilton is Minister of Music Emeritus at the historic Church of the Holy Trinity (Episcopal) in New York City.

As organist, he also conducted the semi-professional Holy Trinity Choir and was Artistic Director of Music at Holy Trinity, the church's subscription concert series for twenty years. An avid educator, Hamilton was a member of the artist faculties of Hunter College, Manhattan School of Music, and Queens College.

Mary Jo Heath, Metropolitan Opera Radio Host

Mary Jo Heath just finished her sixth season as Radio Host of the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts, hosting both the Saturday matinee broadcasts heard by almost ten million people worldwide each week and those heard on the Met Opera Radio Channel on the SiriusXM Satellite network.

Prior to that appointment she spent nine seasons as the Met's Senior Radio Producer, leading the

broadcasts from behind the scenes. During that time her voice was heard on the broadcasts narrating features and interviewing artists, and she was seen on the Met's "Live in HD" series of transmissions into movie theatres around the world interviewing artists.

In her fifteen seasons, she's been part of 1,400+ broadcasts, more than any broadcaster in Met history. She has also served as music critic for the Greenwich Time newspaper and as music advisor to noted opera singers Renée Fleming and Barbara Bonney.



Thorwald Jørgensen, Thereminist

Thorwald Jørgensen is one of the leading classical thereminist in the world. Since the playing technique also resembles that of a string instrument, Thorwald was coached by Saskia Boon, former cellist with the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra. Thorwald has played to great reviews as a chamber musician, soloist and orchestral thereminist in Europe, the Americas, Asia, Australia, and Russia.

Thorwald is an advocate for new theremin repertoire and composers from all over the world have written pieces for him. Recently Thorwald also started composing himself, resulting in several solo pieces for theremin. His first composition, Distant Shores for theremin, voice and loop-station was an instant success and was recorded for TV and radio in Canada, Croatia, Turkey, Australia, Russia, USA and the Netherlands.

The theremin, named after its inventor Leon Theremin, is an electronic musical instrument controlled without physical contact by the performer.

As an actress she starred on Broadway in Sondheim's *Merrily We Roll Along* directed by Harold Prince (1982 Theatre World Award), and in *LoveMusik* (2007); London's West End in *Peg*; Off-Broadway in the musical *Goblin Market* (Drama Desk Award Nominee) and joined the original cast of *Forbidden Broadway*.

The quintessential solo artist, Ann has performed cabaret in major venues across the country, most recently at Feinstein's/54 Below in NYC. An immersive and versatile soloist, Mr. Venkatesh has performed extensively across the United States and Europe. He frequently performs with his wife, pianist Eva Schaumkell, as the Vieness Duo. Originally from California, Mr. Venkatesh earned an Artist Diploma at the Colburn School in Los Angeles and holds degrees from USC and Indiana University.

Internationally acclaimed tenor Matthew Vickers has been praised for his "brilliant and golden voice", his "burnished sound and confident acting", and hailed "a gutsy performer whose glowing tenor voice has interestingly dark, baritonal undertones."

In the 2019-2020 season Mr. Vickers debuted the role of Cavaradossi in Puccini's *Tosca*, reprised his Rodolfo in

La Bohème, premiered with Maggio Musicale Fiorentino as Il Principe Dmitri in Alfano's Risurezzione, performed as the tenor soloist in Beethoven's 9th Symphony, Sam Polk in Floyd's Susannah, and debuted the role of Calaf in Puccini's Turandot in concert with the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra. In the 2015-2016 season.

Mr. Vickers made his Sarasota Opera debut as Arrigo in Verdi's *La Battaglia di Legnano*, stepping in for an ailing colleague for 5 performances; took part in the east coast premiere of Faccio's *Amleto* with Opera Delaware as Laertes, and performed the title role in Mascagni's *L'amico Fritz* with Boston Midsummer Opera.
